Celebrating St. David's Day with the Welsh of Southeast Wisconsin

t David's Day in the USA goes largely unnoticed, unless you happen to be one of the nearly 2 million people of Welsh descent who live in the country (2008 U.S. Census community Survey quotes 1.98 million).

Although the Welsh were some of the earliest of European settlers of the US, with nearly half the signers of the Declaration of Independence claiming Welsh ancestry, the Welsh have pretty much melded into American life. As was noted by President George Washington, the Welsh were

model citizens and
Americans to the core.

According to the Welsh scholar Rhygyfarch, **St. David**, Welsh **Dewi Sant**, born *c*. 520, near St. Bride's

Bay, Pembrokeshire, Wales; died c. 600, Mynwy - St David's today, was the son of the chieftain Sant, and his mother was St. Non.

Many miracles are ascribed to St. David, including the resurrection of a dead child, the restoration of sight to a blind man. One of the more famous miracles associated with him is the formation of a hill beneath him as he preached to a large crowd,



allowing them to see and hear him more clearly.
During this incident, a white dove is said to have landed on his shoulder, and St.
David is often so depicted.

Though the exact date of his death is not certain, tradition holds that it was on March 1, which is the date now marked as St. David's Day. The two most common years given for his death are 601 and 589. The monastery is said to have been "filled with angels as Christ received his soul." His last words to his followers were in a sermon on the previous Sunday. The Welsh Life of St David gives these as, "Lords, brothers and sisters, be joyful, and keep your faith and your creed, and do the little things that you have seen me do and heard about. And as for me, I will walk the path that our fathers have trod before us."

BARA BRITH: TASTE TESTING WELSH TRADITIONAL BREAD

Welsh cakes and bara brith are proud parts of our ancestry. Although Welsh cakes are fairly standard, bara brith is not. What do we know about this special

bread? Do you have a family recipe? How many versions do we have in our Club alone? We ask attendees to bring loaves of their rendition. Enough *bara brith* for 50 samples is needed. If you are able, bring 30 copies of your recipe to share with the group. A "blind taste test" will determine whose *bara brith* will be voted the best.

Bara Brith derives its name from the Welsh language, bara meaning bread and brith translating as speckled. It is claimed to have been invented by a Welsh cook who added dried fruit and spices to a bread dough, creating the first version of the traditional Welsh tea loaf. It is frequently used as a colloquialism - to "over spice the bara brith" means to do something to excess.

The bara brith is made by mixing flour (either white or self-raising), yeast (if not using self-raising flour), butter, mixed dried fruit (such as raisins, currants and sultanas), mixed spices and an egg. Some recipes favor soaking the dried fruit in tea overnight before the baking. This mixture is then proven (allowed to After an initial period, the air is knocked out of the mixture and it is allowed to prove once more. This period of preparation can take up to two hours, including the resting time for the bread mixture. It is then baked in an oven. Bara brith is traditionally served at tea time, alongside tea. It is normally sliced with butter spread on one side.

SUMMER FUN AND SUPPORTING MUSIC

Music Scholarship

ince 1955, the Club has offered an annual music scholarship to a new or continuing college student who is a resident of Wisconsin.

Wales has a history of using music as a primary form of communication. As early as 1187, medieval chronicler Gerallt Gymro stated that the Welsh sang in as many parts as there were people, and that even quite small children could harmonize.

Since at least the 12th century,
Welsh bards and musicians have
participated in musical and poetic
contests called an *Eisteddfod* (a
gathering); this is the equivalent of the
Scottish Mod and the Irish Fleadh
Cheoil.

Very much in that tradition of the *Eisteddfod*, the Club offers a music scholarship open to Wisconsin residents of any ethnic background, although preference may be given to persons of Welsh heritage.

The scholarship is open to applicants who are now enrolled in an institution of higher learning as a music major and who are carrying at least twelve credits per semester. Those who are intending to enroll are also eligible. The scholarship is limited to

undergraduate students.

The amount of the scholarship is \$1,000 - \$500 given to the recipient in the fall and \$500 in the Spring.

Applications for 2018 must be submitted by June 1.



The 2016 and 2017 winner was **Claire Bilicki** of Milwaukee. Claire is
currently a sophomore studying music
at the New England Conservatory of
Music in Boston. Her repertoire
includes secular, classic, religious and
operatic selections. Claire is partly of
Welsh descent on her mother's side of
the family.

I found the Welsh Club via a Google search and was thrilled to learn there is such a thing here.

A HISTORICAL WELSH CLUB PERSPECTIVE

From humble beginnings....

Our organization began as The Welsh Women's Club of the Milwaukee area on February 2, 1952 at the Welsh Presbyterian Church, 1001 N. Milwaukee Street in Milwaukee. Dr. Kendrick Roberts, pastor of the church, and 75 women gathered that day to form the organization.

Grounded in the traditions of the Women Clubs of America,

The purpose of The Welsh Club of the Milwaukee Area is

... "To keep alive the traditions and the cultural characteristics of Welsh people. To promote interest in civic affairs and community welfare. To maintain bonds with people of North America of Welsh heritage or interest. To keep alive present and past ties with Wales."

the organization thrived for many years in this way. We still honor many of those early members who are now seniors, and hence many of our meetings are held in facilities catering to their senior years.

We have continued to thrive as a vibrant Welsh presence in the Milwaukee area. Some of the changes since 1952 include:

- * In 2006 we broadened our scope to include men and family members and changed our name to The Welsh Club of the Milwaukee Area.
- * In 2007 we assumed the assets and responsibilities of The St. David's Society of Waukesha, WI.
- * In 2017 we completed the necessary paperwork to establish the Welsh Club of the Milwaukee Area as a Wisconsin Non-Profit 501(c)3 corporation.

~ ST DAVID'S DAY ~

I DANA is a three piece Celtic music ensemble that plays music from across the Celtic World: Wales, Ireland, Scotland, England, Brittany, Cornwall, and Galicia. Bi Dana is Andreas Transø (Guitar, Bouzouki, Drum, Voice), Blaine McQuinn (Fiddle, Small Pipes, Voice), and Sheila Shigley (Fiddle, Bouzouki, Voice). Sheila is an accomplished singer of Sean Nos style and sings in most Gaelic languages, including Welsh. She has performed for many years

with the vocal group, Navan and has traveled all over performing traditional acapella tunes from the Celtic World. Blaine has played Celtic music for over a decade and is an accomplished fiddle

player, graduating from UW Whitewater in 2010 with a degree in music performance. He was also awarded String player of the year in 2013 He has performed with several bands, including the Brothers Quinn from Southern Wisconsin. Andreas is a wellrounded singer and balladeer from the hills of Gays Mills, and has traveled all over the country telling stories, jokes, and singing songs. He also studied Celtic history at the

University of Limerick, in Ireland. All three musicians bring their own unique style to the group, and together bring velvety vocal harmonies, and driving dance tunes to crowds of all sizes. (see page1)

new tradition was started in Milwaukee in July 2017, when Music Director Trefor Williams and Organist Steve Jensen brought together a capacity crowd of singers for the first annual Milwaukee Gymanfa Ganu. Going forward from 2018, the Welsh Club will take responsibility for this event.

What is a Gymanfa Ganu? A Cymanfa Ganu (or the Gymanfa Ganu) is a festival

of sacred songs sung in four-part harmony organizations in Wisconsin, cymanfaoedd by a congregation led by a musical director and accompanied by organ or piano. Pronounced Ga-mahn-va-ga'-nee, this institution is expressive of the soul of the Cymry (Welsh people), through the medium they love best - human voices blended in musical harmony.
